PURPOSE

The purpose of this Operations Memo is to announce the FoodShare Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA), new Standard Utility Allowance (SUA), and federal standard deductions for meals provided by self-employed child care providers for federal fiscal year (FFY) 2023. FFY 2023 is October 1, 2022, through September 30, 2023.

BACKGROUND

Each year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service announces adjustments to FoodShare COLA (income limits for eligibility, maximum allotments, and deduction

amounts), standard utility allowances, and self-employed child care provider meal deductions. The USDA uses the Thrifty Food Plan (TFP) to calculate maximum allotments for FoodShare. Based on this year’s TFP, FoodShare maximum allotment amounts will increase. States are required to adjust allotments on October 1 of each year based on the Food and Nutrition Act. Changes to FoodShare benefits resulting from the annual changes cannot be overturned in a fair hearing; however, members still have the right to request a fair hearing.

POLICY

FOODSHARE COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS FOR FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2022 2023

Effective for October 1, 2022, eligibility determinations for FoodShare will apply the FFY 2023 COLA amounts, standard utility deductions, and self-employed child care provider meal deductions. CARES was updated on August 26, 2022 to reflect the new amounts. FoodShare redeterminations after August 26, 2022 that result in a change of benefits for October will cause a Notice of Decision to be sent to the member. The new amounts are listed in the tables below. These amounts will be added to [Section 8.1.1 Income Limits](#), [Section 8.1.2 Allotment for Monthly Net Income and FoodShare Group Size](#), and [Section 8.1.3 Deductions](#) of the FoodShare Wisconsin Handbook with the next handbook release.

MINIMUM ALLOTMENT

The minimum monthly FoodShare allotment for categorically eligible food units that include one or two people will increase to \$23.

MAXIMUM EXCESS SHELTER DEDUCTION

The maximum excess shelter deduction will increase to \$624.

HOMELESS SHELTER DEDUCTION

The homeless shelter deduction will increase to \$167.

STANDARD DEDUCTION

The standard deduction is based on the size of an assistance group.

STANDARD UTILITY ALLOWANCES

The Heating Standard Utility Allowance (HSUA) will increase to \$471. The Limited Utility Allowance (LUA) will increase to \$322. The Electric Utility Allowance (EUA) will remain at \$140. The Water and Sewer Allowance (WUA) will increase to \$96. The Cooking Fuel Utility Allowance (FUA) will increase to \$38. The Phone Utility Allowance (PUA) will remain at \$29. The Trash Utility Allowance (TUA) will increase to \$25. Standard utility allowances for FFY 2023 are listed in the following table.

Any cases with FoodShare eligibility run on or after August 26, 2022, will have the new SUA amounts applied, effective October 1, 2022.

SELF-EMPLOYED CHILD CARE PROVIDER DEDUCTIONS

Self-employed child care providers can deduct the cost of meals provided to enrolled children from the income earned by their child care business. They may report the actual cost of the meals, or they may use the federal standard deductions. The reported costs may not exceed allowable federal standard deductions based on the eligible tier. Tier 1 applies to households with income at or below 185 percent of the FPL income guidelines. Tier 2 applies to all other households.

ASSET LIMIT FOR FOODSHARE FOR THE ELDERLY BLIND, OR DISABLED

The asset limit applies to Elderly, Blind, or Disabled (EBD) food units (at least one member is elderly, blind, or disabled) with gross income over 200% of the FPL and with a net income that does not exceed 100% FPL. The asset limit will increase to \$4,250.
