Minority Health Program (MHP)

Created in 1999, the MHP:

- Identifies barriers to health and health care that prevent economically disadvantaged Wisconsin minorities from participating fully and equally in all aspects of life;
- Monitors current and emerging State policies, procedures, practices, statutes, and rules to determine how they positively or negatively affect the health of economically disadvantaged minority community members; and
- Disseminates information on the health status of economically disadvantaged minority group members living in Wisconsin

Wisconsin Legislature: 20.435(1)(cr) Wisconsin Legislature: 250.20

Eligibility Requirements

- Applicants must be a nonprofit organization.
- Project will improve the health status of economically disadvantaged minority group members (*Minorities, as defined by Wisconsin Statute §250.20, include African Americans, American Indians, Hispanics, and Asians. Economically disadvantaged, as defined by Wisconsin Statute §250.20, means having an income that is at or below 125 percent of the poverty line*).
- Specify at least one <u>Social Determinants of Health (SDoH)</u> that your project will incorporate or impact
- 50% Match Requirement (Applicable only to Community Grants funding opportunity; not applicable for Public Health Information Campaign (PHIC) opportunity).



50% Match Requirement for Community Grants

- An awardee of a grant under this subsection shall provide, for at least 50 percent of the grant amount, matching funds that may consist of (state or federal) funding or an in-kind contribution.
- In-kind donations are non-cash donations of a good or service that can be given a value and is used in achieving your program objectives. Expenses incurred by an organization to meet the project goals and objectives that are not part of the State share may be considered match. The following are generally accepted as in-kind contributions:
 - Personnel time given to the project (volunteer hours)
 - Use of existing equipment
 - Use of existing laboratory equipment or facilities
 - Personal loan from another organization/corporation
 - Waived or unrecovered indirect cost amount if funding agency pays indirect cost and permits as in-kind contribution



Funding Description – Community Grants

- Community Grants will support the work of community-based or tribal organizations that work with minoritized and economically marginalized groups, as defined in statute, in areas of the state with chronic and pronounced health disparities to engage impacted communities in developing solutions and strategies regarding policy, system and environmental changes that would improve health and wellbeing.
- Successful applicants through this funding opportunity will
 prioritize efforts that align with a health disparity that has been
 identified through community input. Projects must be aligned
 with one or more of the Social Determinants of Health.



Funding Description – Community Grants

- The Community Grants Program will support community capacity building projects that address the structural conditions that underly complex health outcomes and promote health equity.
- Projects should go beyond the traditional partner engagement, to amplify the vision and capacities of community members at the grassroots/local level who have the greatest understanding of the current challenges within their communities; and the most to gain from innovative new solutions.



Funding Description – Public Health Information Campaign (PHIC)

PHIC will support the work of community-based or Tribal organizations that work with minoritized and economically marginalized groups, as defined in statue, in areas of the state with chronic and pronounced health disparities. PHIC will fund a project from one communitybased organization that raises public awareness of health disparities and health equity issues impacting economicaldisadvantaged communities and amplifies voices of those impacted by developing and disseminating informational messaging.



Funding Description – Public Health Information Campaign (PHIC)

- Applicants should demonstrate how they plan to engage community partners and community members in their public health information campaign on minority health.
- Successful applicants through this funding opportunity will prioritize efforts
 that align with a health disparity that has been identified through community
 input. Projects must be aligned with one or more of the Social Determinants
 of Health (SDoH).



Program Requirements

The MHP Grants Program is a capacity building, cohort model, grants initiative. Funded projects are required to:

- Participate in bi-monthly (every other month) meetings focused on capacity building, relationship building, and shared learning with other funded projects.
- Present at the Annual Minority Health Month Grantee Forum where projects will be expected to provide a brief presentation about their project, progress towards stated goals and share learning and insights.
- Respond to communications and requests for information from the Office of Health Equity/Minority Health Program staff.
- A mid-project check-in with MHP staff is required to discuss progress towards stated goals and to address any questions or concerns.



Reporting Requirements

- Submit a total of three written reports:
 - Two progress reports will be due throughout the project period. The first progress report is due October 31, 2024, and the second progress report is due February 28, 2025.
 - A final report will be due 30 days after the project end date on July 31, 2025.
- We encourage grantees to identify ways to disseminate relevant results and outcomes that come from implementation of the project. This could be done via listserv, newsletters, journal articles, social and earned media, webinars, or presentations at conferences, community meetings or other events.
 - Projects will have an opportunity to report back on any dissemination activities in their progress reports and at the annual forum.
- Projects are expected to include updates on their sustainability plans and impact evaluations in their reports.



Financial Information

- Funds operate through a cost-reimbursement model and are not lump sum.
- Funds are monitored on a quarterly basis to ensure budget is being spent down and will be utilized in full.
 - DHS reserves the right to reallocate unspent funds
- To receive funds grantees must:
 - Submit invoices for allowable expenses not more often than monthly and no less than quarterly throughout the grant period.
 - Meet and document the 50% match requirement on each invoice. (For Community Grants Only)

The Office of Health Equity (OHE), Wisconsin Minority Health Program (MHP), will award 5-7 community grants to support the work of community-based or tribal organizations that work with minoritized and economically marginalized groups, as defined in Wisconsin Statute § 250.20, in areas of the state with chronic and pronounced health disparities to engage impacted communities in developing solutions and strategies regarding policy, system and environmental changes that would improve health and well-being. Projects can request up to \$50,000 with a 50% match requirement.
