Carbapenem-Resistant Enterobacterales (CRE) as a Reportable Condition in Wisconsin

#### PLEASE DISTRIBUTE WIDELY

Since July 2018, carbapenem-resistant Enterobacterales (CRE) has been a reportable condition in Wisconsin per Wis. Admin. Code ch. DHS 145. CRE, and specifically carbapenemase-producing carbapenem-resistant Enterobacterales (CP-CRE), has been a Category I reportable condition in Wisconsin since that time. Category I conditions are of urgent public health importance, and require immediate notification by speaking with a local health officer or their designee, followed by a fax, mail, or electronic report within 24 hours.

This memo provides updated guidance for reporting CP-CRE in accordance with ch.145:

- In alignment with current reporting guidelines for other carbapenemase-producing organisms, CP-CRE shall be considered a Category II reportable condition in Wisconsin, effective immediately.
- This memo also removes the requirement for Infection Preventionists in acute care and nursing
  home settings to report CRE into the National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) as of May 1,
  2022. Since cases of confirmed CP-CRE are currently reported in the Wisconsin Electronic
  Disease Surveillance System (WEDSS), NHSN reporting is no longer needed to enable statewide
  surveillance for this organism.

Note that a <u>taxonomy change</u> was adopted in the scientific community in 2020 to use "Enterobacterales" as the name of a new scientific order. *Enterobacteriaceae* are now a family within the Enterobacterales order. Language related to CRE in this memo has been updated to reflect this change.

### **Case Definition and Reporting Information**

For specific information about the CP-CRE case definition, confirmatory testing by the Wisconsin State Laboratory of Hygiene (WSLH) of isolates suspected to be CP-CRE, and WEDSS reporting requirements, see the <u>Carbapenemase-Producing Organisms Case Reporting and Investigation Protocol</u> (EpiNet).
