


**Members** — Individuals receiving FoodShare Benefits

## Who received FoodShare benefits in Wisconsin?




### 1. What is the age distribution of FoodShare members and age gender ratio?

56% of the FoodShare members are female and 44% are male. 58% are adults and 42% are minors. 39% of AGs include minors. Adults between ages 6–17 has the largest number for any grouping, making up to 27% of recipients. 42.18% of FoodShare members are 17 and younger.



### 2. Households with Minors

Of the AGs that contain minors, 69% have one parent in the AG, 21% have two or more parents, and 10% have no parents.



### 3. How many recipients are elderly, blind or disabled (EBD)?



24.5% of FoodShare members are EBD. 44.8% of AGs contain at least one individual that is EBD. The average allotment for EBD AGs is \$122. However, 32% of the EBD caseload is receiving an allotment of \$20 or less.

Among Total AGs



First-time AGs are households where no one has received benefits in the past 60 months. The average no. of FoodShare AGs that are first-time recipients is 4,317




## 5. What are the member compositions?


## 6. What is the historical caseload trend?

33% of AGs have at least one person working in the month of March 2018






## 8. What is the average monthly income of an AG?


The average monthly income of AGs that have at least one individual working is \$390, a decrease from last month. 42% of adult FoodShare recipients are employed, same as last month.

% of Adult FoodShare Employed




FoodShare Members Average Monthly Earned Income by Age Segments




## 9. How many working families receive FoodShare?

Working families (households with at least one minor and at least one parent of a minor that also earn income) make up to 20.5% of the statewide FoodShare AGs, average 1 person per AG, and average \$1,418 in earned income per month. 58.6% of all families are working.


Working Families vs. Total FoodShare AGs




Working Families vs. Total Families




Working Families with Number of Parents



Working Families Unduplicated FoodShare Members




Working Families Average Earned Income
