All topic sheets include relevant social determinants of health to put health experiences and behaviors into a larger social context.




























PURPOSE

The PRAMS quarterly newsletters are designed to share project updates and highlight recent data with the Steering Committee and other organizations invested in maternal and infant health outcomes in Wisconsin.

Breastfeeding

Breastfeeding initiation and duration have increased since 2009, but these trends have flattened out in the last five years.

The percent of parents who ever breastfed increased from 83% in 2009 to 88% in 2016-2017, and the percent of parents continuing to breastfeed for at least eight weeks increased from 62% to 69%.

Breastfeeding trends are consistent across racial and ethnic groups, but disparities persist both in initiation and duration.

Successful and consistent implementation of baby-friendly hospital practices can contribute to decreases in racial, sociocultural, and ethnic disparities in breastfeeding rates. Social support for breastfeeding and the availability of comfortable and safe spaces to express milk also increase the likelihood that parents will begin and continue breastfeeding.

ACCESS TO THE RESEARCH FILE

If you would like to access the PRAMS research file for your own analysis using appropriate statistical software, please email the PRAMS team to request an application.

Your completed application will be reviewed by the Division of Public Health Data Governance Board. Upon approval, a Data Use Agreement will be drafted granting you access to PRAMS data for your stated purpose.
