# Barriers for Voters with Disabilities & Older Adults

- ▶ Major barriers historically:
  - Accessibility concerns
  - Photo ID
  - Failure to provide accommodations
  - Transportation
  - Lack of training for poll workers
  - Limited knowledge of the law
  - Stigma and discrimination

# Barriers Reported during the April, May, August Elections

- People with disabilities have high vulnerability for COVID 19; voting in person became high risk.
- Confusion and changing environment due to changes in the law related to litigation.
- Many voters disenfranchised.
- DMV provides photo IDs for voting: DMV open by appointment only.
- Absentee ballots were late or did not arrive; lack of screen reader accessible absentee ballot.
- Difficulties requesting absentee ballot including requirement to provide copy of photo ID.

# Barriers reported during the April & May Elections

- Witness requirement for absentee ballots was a barrier for some voters.
- No Special Voting Deputies in care facilities; no family members or other visitors to assist. Residents not allowed to leave facilities to vote in person
- Transportation often high risk or not available.
- For those who voted in person, concerns included long lines, lack of curbside voting, some issues with failure to provide accommodations, anxiety about health risk.

# Voter Registration Deadlines

- By Mail or online: Wednesday: October 14
- Deadline to register in person at your municipal clerk's office: October 30
- In-Person: Tuesday, November 3

# Voter Eligibility

## You are eligible to vote if:

- You are a U.S. Citizen
- You will be at least 18 years old on or before Election Day
- You have resided in WI for 28 days prior to the election
- You are not currently serving a sentence including incarceration, parole, probation, or extended supervision for a felony conviction
- You have not been determined by a court to be ineligible to vote (for example: through a guardianship decision)

# Voter registration

## Who Needs to Register?

- First time voters
- If you've moved
- If you've changed your name
- If you haven't voted in over 4 years

## How to register:

- **Online** (up to 20 days before the election)
- **By mail to your municipal clerk** (up to 20 days before the election)
- **In person at your municipal clerk's office** (through the Friday before the election)
- **At your polling place on Election Day**

# Am I Registered to Vote?

- ▶ Check at [www.myvote.wi.gov](http://www.myvote.wi.gov).
- ▶ Confirm your voting address and mailing address are current (can update online).
- ▶ Options if you are not registered to vote:
  - ▶ Online at [myvote.wi.gov/](http://myvote.wi.gov/) Requires Photo ID.
  - ▶ Mail. Up to 20 days before Election Day. Mail completed form to your municipal clerk.
  - ▶ In person, at the municipal clerk's office. Must provide proof of residence.
  - ▶ At your polling place on Election Day. Must provide proof of residence and photo ID.

# What do you need to register?

## Online -

1. WI Drivers License or WI ID Card

## Paper Form -

1. An acceptable proof of residence document
2. Your WI DL/ID # or the last 4 digits of your social security # if you don't have a WI ID

# Proof of Residence

You **MUST** provide a **Proof of Resident** document when registering to vote, with voter's name and current address.

- ▶ If you register online at [myvote.wi.gov/](https://myvote.wi.gov/) your valid State of Wisconsin driver's license or State of Wisconsin ID card issued by the DMV qualify as a valid Proof of Residence document.
- ▶ If you register to vote by mail, in-person in your clerk's office, or at your polling place on Election Day, you must provide a **Proof of Residence document** such as current utility bill, lease, paycheck or paystub, university ID card or other official document showing voter's name and current address. Could be an intake document from group home or nursing home.


# Wisconsin photo ID requirements

- ▶ Wisconsin voters must show an acceptable photo ID when voting at the polls on Election Day.
- ▶ When requesting an absentee ballot, the voter must provide photo ID unless they provided it with a previous request, or are exempt by law.
- ▶ An acceptable Photo ID for voting does NOT have to include a current address. You only prove your address when registering.



# Absentee Voting

- ▶ Due to concerns about COVID-19, the Disability Vote Coalition is encouraging voters with disabilities and older adults to consider voting absentee. See our fact sheet on absentee voting for guidance. [Disabilityvote.org](https://disabilityvote.org)
- ▶ Special Voting Deputies will not be dispatched to care facilities to assist with voting for the November election.
- ▶ Care facility staff have a responsibility to assist residents in exercising their right to vote. This can include activities such as helping residents complete their ballots, voter registration forms and/or absentee requests or by acting as a witness.
- ▶ Facility staff should only assist the resident with their permission and may not influence their decision nor disclose to others who the resident voted for. Facility staff can read the ballot, candidate names, party affiliations, ballot instructions and can mark the ballot as directed by the voter.

# Voting Absentee? Do Not Delay!

- ▶ Deadline to Request an Absentee Ballot:
  - For Regular voters: October 29, 2020 @ 5 PM
  - For Indefinitely Confined voters: October 30, 2020 @ 5 PM
- These are the “legal” deadlines.
  - If you make a request in late October, you won’t have enough time to request, receive and return your absentee ballot.
  - Request your ballot ASAP. October 20 might be an “unofficial” cutoff date.

# How to Request an Absentee Ballot

- ▶ Request an absentee ballot online, by mail, or inperson at municipal clerk's office.
- ▶ Your absentee ballot will be mailed to you by your clerk.
- ▶ A general guideline:  
If a voter needs an accommodation, such as a large print ballot, include that information on the absentee request or contact your clerk as soon as possible.

# Photo ID & Absentee Voting for Care Facilities

With the voter's absentee ballot request:

- ▶ The care facility administrator can sign a special certificate (EL-122sp) to verify the voter's identity if they do not have a photo ID.
- ▶ This certificate is available for download on the WI Elections Commission website at [elections.wi.gov/forms/el-122](https://elections.wi.gov/forms/el-122).
- ▶ Or the resident may certify they are an “indefinitely confined” voter, which also exempts the voter from providing a photo ID.

# Indefinitely Confined Voters

- ▶ A voter may consider themselves indefinitely confined if they need to vote absentee due to disability, age, illness, or infirmity.
- ▶ According to the WEC, “Designation of indefinitely confined status is for each individual voter to make based upon their current circumstance. It does not require permanent or total inability to travel outside of the residence. Statutes do not establish the option to require proof or documentation from indefinitely confined voters.”
- ▶ An “indefinitely confined” voter will have their ballot mailed to them for each election until they don’t return a ballot. If this occurs, the municipal clerk will contact the voter to see if they want to remain on the “indefinitely confined” voter list.
- ▶ Indefinitely confined voters do not need to provide a Photo ID.
- ▶ How to apply to be an “indefinitely confined” voter: Complete the absentee ballot application. Choose the “indefinitely confined” option in section 6 of the form, certifying that you are indefinitely confined, or send a request in writing to your [municipal clerk](#).

# Absentee Ballot Request By Mail

- ▶ If you can't request a ballot online, you may complete a paper absentee ballot request form.
- ▶ You may receive this form in the mail – the Wisconsin Election Commission recently mailed absentee ballot request forms to all registered voters who did not have an absentee request on file.
- ▶ Download a copy of the form from the Wisconsin Election Commission website. Their website is [elections.wi.gov](http://elections.wi.gov).
- ▶ Mail your completed absentee ballot request to your clerk with a copy of your photo ID, unless exempt by law. Mail it ASAP to allow time to receive and return the ballot.

# Absentee Ballot Request By Email

- Email your clerk to request an absentee ballot.
- State your full name, Wisconsin voting address, the election you want a ballot for and mailing address if different than voting address. Include a copy of your photo ID with the email unless it is already on file or if you are exempt by law.
- If you are an Indefinitely confined voter, state that in your email.
- Your ballot will be mailed to you: it will not be emailed.

# Absentee Ballot Request In Person

- ▶ Complete the request form at your clerk's office.
- ▶ Provide a copy of your acceptable photo ID with the application, unless exempt by law, or if you already have one on file.

# Completing an Absente Ballot

- Carefully follow the instructions included with your absentee ballot to make sure your vote is counted.
- Use black pen to complete your ballot.
- Vote your ballot in the presence of an adult witness.
  - Your witness can be any U.S. citizen who is at least 18 years old. A witness can be a friend, spouse, family member, care worker, etc.
  - A candidate on the ballot for this election **cannot** be a witness.
  - The witness must verify that you completed the absentee ballot. Because voting is a private activity, your witness cannot tell you who or what to vote for and should not see the choices you make on your ballot.

# Absentee Ballot Envelope (cont.)

- Seal the envelope in the presence of the witness
- Fill out the required section of the form on the absentee ballot envelope:
  - Voter Signature: You (or your assistant) must sign in the Certification of Voter section.
  - Have your witness sign the certificate envelope on the line marked "Signature of Witness" and write their full address (street number, street name, city) underneath the witness signature.
  - Doublecheck the voter information section to be sure it is accurate.
  - If any of the required information above is missing, your ballot **will not be counted**.

# Getting Assistance

- **If a voter needs help reading or filling out your ballot or absentee return envelope**, they may ask for assistance from anyone who is not their employer or a representative of their labor union.
- The assistant may also serve as a witness for the voter.
- Explaining how to fill out the voter's ballot or return envelope is not considered "assistance".
- The assistant must sign in the Certification of Voter Assistance section on the voter's ballot.
- The assistant can read the ballot to the voter or fill out the ballot under their direction, but cannot tell them how to vote.

# Getting Assistance (cont.)

## ▶ On the absentee return envelope

- If someone signs a voter's absentee return envelope on their behalf, make sure they also sign in the Certification of Assistant section.
- The assistant may also serve as the voter's witness.

# Correcting Ballot Mistakes

- If a voter makes a mistake while marking their ballot or otherwise require a replacement ballot, contact their municipal clerk ASAP.
- If there is not enough time to request a replacement ballot and the voter has not returned their ballot, they may still vote in-person at the polls on Election Day.

# Returning an Absentee Ballot

- Completed ballots must be received in time to be delivered to your polling place **no later than 8 PM on Election Day.**
- **We encourage voters to return their absentee ballot ASAP. DO NOT DELAY.**
- There are a few options for returning your ballot.

# Mailing your Absentee Ballot

- ▶ If you mail your absentee ballot, allow plenty of time.
- ▶ The US Postal Service recommends mailing your ballot at least one week before Election Day. Returning a ballot from overseas may take longer.
- ▶ There have been concerns about the timeliness of deliveries from the US Postal Service. After October 20, you may want to play it safe and look at other options for returning your ballot.

# Other Options for Returning Your Ballot

- Drop it off at your municipal clerk's office.
- Drop it off at your polling place or central count location.  
Note: Check with your clerk to ask if your community accepts absentee ballots at the polling place.
  - The City of Milwaukee, Green Bay, Kenosha and some other communities that use "central count", accept ballots at central count locations rather than at the polling place.
- Drop it off in an absentee ballot drop box (if available). These locations will be added soon to the [myvote.wi.gov](https://myvote.wi.gov) website.

# Tips for Absentee Ballot Return

- Absentee ballots may not be returned by email or fax.
- A voter may ask someone else to deliver their completed sealed ballot for them.
- If you run out of time to return your absentee ballot, you still have the option to vote in person at your polling place on election day or to early vote. Remember you may only vote once.
- You may check the status of your absentee ballot on [myvote.wi.gov](https://myvote.wi.gov).
- *Remember the deadline to Return Absentee Ballot:*  
November 3, 2020 @ 8:00 PM

# Early Voting at your Clerk's Office

- A voter can apply for and vote their absentee ballot in-person in their municipal clerk's office or another location designated for absentee voting in their community.
- Each city, village and town in Wisconsin is responsible for setting the dates and hours of in-person absentee voting for their municipality. **To find the dates and hours for in-person absentee voting where you live**, contact your municipal clerk.
- Early voting begins October 20<sup>th</sup>. Locations are being added to MyVoteWisconsin.

# Early Voting Tips

- Early voting begins on October 20<sup>th</sup>.
- Be sure to bring your photo ID.
- Curbside voting is required by law for any voter who cannot enter the polling place due to disability, including at early voting locations. This may include voters who are immunocompromised or have symptoms of COVID-19. *Contact your Municipal Clerk before Election Day to learn how to access curbside voting.*
- Early voting is a good option for someone who also needs to register to vote. To register to vote, you will need to bring a proof of residence such as a utility bill or bank statement.

# Voter Rights

- You have the right to vote privately and independently.
- You have the right to access the polling place, including an accessible route to enter the building.
- You have the right to use an accessible voting machine at your polling place.
- All polling places are required by law to have an accessible voting machine.

*Note: The law does not require this for early in-person absentee voting,*

- You have the right to assistance marking your ballot. You may bring someone to assist you or ask a poll worker for assistance. Poll workers are required to assist a voter if they request it.
  - ▶ *Note: You cannot receive assistance from your employer or from your union representative.*

# Voter Rights (cont.)

- You have the right to ask for reasonable accommodations at the polling place.
  - ▶ Some common accommodations might be: *a chair to sit on a signature guide a magnifying glass, assistance with stating a person's name and address, tools to help poll workers interact with deaf and hard of hearing voters such as pen and paper or an easel for announcements.*
- If a voter cannot enter the absentee voting location or polling place due to disability, Wis. Stat. § 6.82(1) requires that curbside voting must be available.

*Tip: contact your clerk in advance to discuss how to access curbside voting. (number to call, bell to ring, honk horn etc.)*
