Wisconsin Family Health Survey, 2017 Release

The 2015 Wisconsin Family Health Survey includes a number of questions about mental health and mental health care. Family Health Survey estimates indicate that 11% of Wisconsin residents received mental health services in the past year.

Of those who received mental health services:



60% were female and 40% were male.



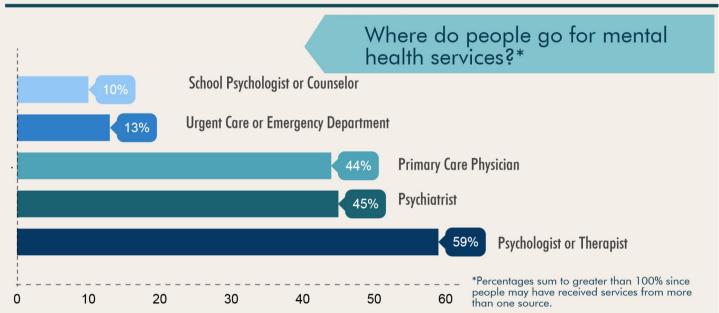
14% were children under the age of 18.



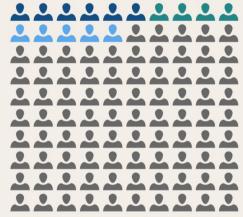
62% of adults, ages 18 to 64, were employed.



86% were satisfied with the mental health care they received.



Depression and Anxiety*



6% of Wisconsin residents have been diagnosed with depression. 4% have been diagnosed with anxiety. 5% have been diagnosed with both anxiety and depression.

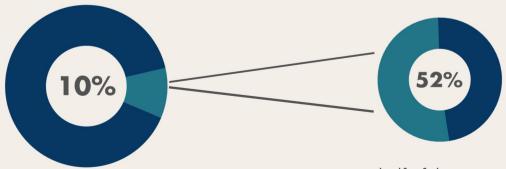
*Anxiety includes those diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

Mental Health-Related Activity Limitations*

The Family Health Survey includes questions about activity limitations due to one's mental health. These include being prevented from working/going to school, having difficulty running errands alone, having trouble eating/dressing/bathing/using the toilet, and having serious difficulty concentrating, remembering, making decisions, and/or having periods of confusion.



While only a small proportion of adults were reported to have at least one of these mental health-related activity limitations in the past year...

...over half of those reported to have a mental health-related activity limitation did not receive any mental health services in the past year.

*Reported only for adults 18 years of age and older.
