Wisconsin Newborn Screening: Three Parts for a Healthy Start

Have you ever wondered

- What is the newborn screening process?
- How can newborn screening help my baby?
- How will I receive the results of my baby's three screens?

Newborn screening is for every baby! The newborn screening process reveals if your baby might have certain conditions. Most babies are born healthy. The newborn screening process is the best way to find newborns with potentially serious conditions and get them the care they need.





Blood screening

Several drops of blood are collected from your baby's heel 24-48 hours after birth. This sample is sent to the Wisconsin Newborn Screening Lab. The lab tests your baby's blood for conditions like cystic fibrosis and sickle cell disease.

Your baby's doctor will contact you if your baby screens positive and help you schedule additional testing.

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Heart screening

Newborn heart screening evaluates your baby for congenital (born with) heart disease. A sensor is used to measure how much oxygen your baby's heart is pumping throughout their body.

Low oxygen levels may indicate a heart problem. If this happens, action will be taken right away to get your baby the help they need.



Hearing screening

Newborn hearing screening checks your baby's ability to hear. Early diagnosis of hearing differences can improve your baby's ability to communicate. It also helps your baby bond with you.

If your baby needs an additional test, your health care professional will help you schedule an appointment.
