Standard Reports Produced by the Wisconsin Hospital Association Information Center

[Wisconsin Stat. § 153.05\(2m\)\(c\)](#) directs the Department of Health Services (DHS) to submit a report about the reports produced by the Wisconsin Hospital Association (WHA). Specifically, DHS is required to submit to the chief clerk of each house of the legislature “a report concerning the content and number of reports and currency of information and reports generated in the previous calendar year” by the Wisconsin Hospital Association Information Center (WHAIC), the entity under contract to produce the reports under § 153.05(2m).

The ***Hospital Rate Increase Report*** is a web-based spreadsheet showing the dates of hospital price increases that caused a hospital’s gross patient revenue to increase faster than the rate of inflation (specifically, the federal government’s consumer price index). State law requires Wisconsin hospitals to report price increases to the WHA Information Center and to the public via local newspapers. The web-based spreadsheet is updated “real-time” throughout a calendar year, with a final spreadsheet report produced at the end of the calendar year. For fiscal year 2026, there was an average annualized rate increase of 4.3%. In 2025, there was an average annualized rate increase of 4.7%. [See the Hospital Rate Increase Report 2026.](#)

The ***Guide to Wisconsin Hospitals*** presents descriptive financial, utilization, and staffing data about individual Wisconsin hospitals, and provides summary and trend information for selected aggregate data. Data sources are the Hospital Fiscal Survey and the Annual Survey of Hospitals submitted annually by all Wisconsin hospitals. In October 2025, WHAIC published the report covering fiscal year 2024. Respondents included 140 general medical-surgical (GMS) hospitals, of which, 58 were critical access hospitals (CAHs). Among the specialty hospitals, four were long-term acute care (LTAC) hospitals, 14 were psychiatric hospitals, and two were state-operated mental health institutions. The ***Uncompensated Health Care Report, Wisconsin Hospitals*** publication provides annual uncompensated health care information for GMS hospitals, psychiatric hospitals, alcohol and other drug abuse hospitals, and rehabilitation hospitals that are not state or federal facilities. The data source is the Annual Hospital Fiscal Survey, which includes uncompensated health care and fiscal information for one year. In October 2025, WHAIC published the report covering fiscal year 2024 from 166 hospitals. Wisconsin provided \$1.8 billion of uncompensated health care services to their patients in fiscal year 2024, this was an increase of 30.5% from fiscal year 2023. The ***Health Care Data Report*** (termed a “patient-level data utilization, charge and quality report” in the administrative rules) presents an annual summary of patient data on the utilization and charges at Wisconsin hospitals and freestanding ambulatory surgery centers (FASCs). The report is divided into three sections: 1) inpatient data, 2) ambulatory surgery data, and 3) emergency department data. In August 2025, WHAIC published the report covering calendar year 2024. In 2024, there were over 574,300 inpatient hospitalizations, over 1 million ambulatory surgery cases, and over 1.9 million emergency department visits.

Compared to 2023, inpatient hospitalizations increased 4%, ambulatory surgery cases stayed relatively stable, and emergency department visits increased 1.4% in 2023. [See the Health Care Data Report 2024.](#)

The *Wisconsin Inpatient Hospital Quality Indicators Report* provides information about procedure volume, utilization and in-hospital mortality for common conditions and procedures in GMS hospitals in Wisconsin. After the 2015 release of the report, WHAIC now provides the most currently available annual data on the [CheckPoint](#) website. It is intended to provide information about the quality of care in Wisconsin GMS hospitals that will be used to make administrative and system changes to improve patient outcomes. The quality measures used in the report are derived from hospital data submitted to WHA by GMS hospitals for inpatient stays. One such measure is patient experience, where in 2024, 77% of patients rated their experience as “high.” This is above the national average of 72%.
