Consent 101

What is consent?

For any sexual activity to happen, everyone needs to say yes and choose to participate willingly and freely. Sexual activity does not just mean sex—it includes kissing, hugging, making out, cuddling, and touching.

Things that *aren't* consent:

- A “yes” under the influence of drugs/alcohol
- Staying quiet
- Consent at a previous time
- Consent for a different activity
- The absence of “no”

Understanding consent...

- Consent can be given and taken away at any time
- Consent can't be assumed
- Just because you're in a relationship doesn't mean you don't have to ask for consent
- Only a “yes” means yes

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
