Wisconsin Marriages and Divorces

Bureau of Health Information and Policy Division of Public Health Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services

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Introduction

This report presents key information about marriages and divorces that occurred in Wisconsin in 2007. It also contains information from selected previous years, as well as information on the number and rate of marriages and divorces, both in Wisconsin and nationally. The sources of data for Wisconsin are marriage and divorce certificates on file with the Bureau of Health Information and Policy, Division of Public Health, Department of Health and Family Services.

The collection of marriage and divorce data is mandated by Chapter 69 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Chapter 69 authorizes the Department of Health and Family Services to supervise and direct the collection of these data. This statute also specifies how local registrars are to collect and file certificates of marriage.

The Department of Health and Family Services produced this publication. Staff of the Vital Records Registration and Statistics Unit, Bureau of Health Information and Policy, collected and compiled the marriage and divorce records. Joyce Knapton drafted the summaries in this report and produced the computer programs to generate the tables. Patricia Nametz edited the report. The report was prepared under the supervision of John Kiesow, State Registrar, Vital Records Section, and Jane Kraus, Supervisor, Registration and Statistics Unit. 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Key Findings

- A total of 32,159 marriages occurred in Wisconsin in 2007, representing a decrease from the 33,437 marriages that occurred in 2006. These counts reflect all marriages that occurred in Wisconsin (of both residents and non-residents of the state).
- The number of marriages has been declining annually since 1980.
- Wisconsin's marriage rate in 2007 was 5.7 per 1,000 total population, lower than the 2006 rate (6.0). The marriage rate has gradually declined since 1980, when the rate was 8.7.
- The marriage rate in Wisconsin has been consistently lower than the national rate for more than 80 years. The United States provisional marriage rate for the 12 months ending in July 2007 was 7.3 per 1,000 population.
- The median age for first marriages in 2007 was 25.2 years for women and 26.8 years for men. In 1960, the median age at first marriage was 20.4 for brides and 22.9 for grooms.
- Since 1960, the bride in a first marriage, on average, has been a year or two younger than the groom.
- In 2007, the months with the highest number of marriages were June, August and September. September was the most popular month to marry.
- Milwaukee County had the highest number of marriages in 2007 (4,501), followed by Dane County (2,622), Waukesha County (1,996), and Brown County (1,523). These are Wisconsin's four most populous counties. All of these counties had a decrease in the number of marriages from 2006 to 2007.
- A total of 16,458 divorces occurred in Wisconsin in 2007, for a divorce rate of 2.9 per 1,000 total population. This is slightly lower than the 2006 rate (3.0).
- The divorce rate in Wisconsin has been consistently lower than the national rate for more than 80 years. For the 12 months ending in July 2007, the provisional United States divorce rate was 3.6.
- The total number of Wisconsin divorces that occurred in 2007 was 51 percent of the total number of Wisconsin marriages that occurred. This is higher than the 2006 percentage (50 percent).
- The highest number of divorces in 2007 occurred in Milwaukee County (2,433 divorces and 10 annulments), followed by Dane County (1,290 divorces and 6 annulments) and Waukesha County (998 divorces), reflecting the large populations of these three counties.
- Fifty-two percent of all Wisconsin divorces in 2007 involved families with children under 18 years of age. Among divorces involving children, an average of 1.8 children were affected by each divorce.

- The lowest number of marriages occurred in the counties of Menominee (22), Florence (28), Pepin • (41) and Iron (43).

Technical Notes

Marriage Reporting Requirements

As specified in Chapter 69, Wisconsin Statutes, the following is a brief outline of the sequence of events which take place when a marriage occurs in Wisconsin:

- The filing party (officiant) must register the certificate of marriage with the local Register of Deeds (where the marriage took place) within 3 days after the event.
- The local Register of Deeds must transmit the marriage certificate to the State Registrar within 10 working days after its receipt.

Divorce Reporting Requirements

As specified in Chapter 69, Wisconsin Statutes, the following is what takes place when a divorce occurs in Wisconsin:

• At the end of every biweekly period the filing party (clerk of any court) must send to the State Registrar a report of every divorce or annulment of marriage granted during that period.

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
