## Introduction

This report presents key information about marriages and divorces that occurred in Wisconsin in 2014. It also contains information from selected previous years, as well as information on the number and rate of marriages and divorces, both in Wisconsin and nationally. The sources of data for Wisconsin are marriage and divorce certificates on file with the State Vital Records Office, Office of Health Informatics, Division of Public Health, Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

The collection of marriage and divorce data is mandated by Chapter 69 of the Wisconsin Statutes. Chapter 69 authorizes the Department of Health Services to supervise and direct the collection of these data. This statute also specifies how local registrars are to collect and file certificates of marriage.

The Department of Health Services produced this publication. Staff of the State Vital Records Office, Registration and Statistics Unit, collected and compiled the marriage and divorce records. Joyce Knapton prepared the report and wrote the narrative. Patricia Nametz, Bureau of Operations in the Division of Public Health, edited the report. The report was prepared under the supervision of Lisa Walker, State Registrar, Vital Records Section; Lisa Hebl, Supervisor, External Operations Unit, Vital Records Section; and Oskar Anderson, Director of the Office of Health Informatics.

## Key Findings

- A total of 32,776 marriages occurred in Wisconsin in 2014, representing an increase of 2,797 marriages from the 29,979 marriages that occurred in 2013. These counts reflect all marriages that occurred in Wisconsin (of both residents and non-residents of the state).
- Wisconsin's marriage rate in 2014 was 5.7 per 1,000 total population. The marriage rate has declined since 1980, when the rate was 8.7, but in 2014 it increased to the 2007 rate.
- The marriage rate in Wisconsin has been consistently lower than the national rate for over 90 years.
- The median age for people marrying for the first time in 2014 was 27.5. In 1960, the median age at first marriage was 21.6.
- In 2014, the months with the highest number of marriages were June, August and September. August was the most popular month to marry. In each of the past eight years, the month with the most marriages averaged approximately 14-15 percent of that year's total marriages. In those same eight years, the month in which the fewest marriages occurred was January.
- Milwaukee County had the highest number of marriages in 2014 (4,911), followed by Dane County (3,022), Waukesha County (1,929) and Brown County (1,674). These are Wisconsin's four most populous counties.
- A total of 15,243 divorces occurred in Wisconsin in 2014, for a divorce rate of 2.7 per 1,000 total population. This is lower than the 2013 rate (2.8).
- In 2014, the ratio of Wisconsin marriages to Wisconsin divorces was 2.2 to 1 (there were 2.2 marriages for each divorce). This ratio had been falling since 1920, when it was 9.2 to 1; it was 6.7 to 1 in 1960; 2.2 to 1 in 1990; and 2.1 to 1 in 2000. Since 2011, it has risen slightly each year.
- The highest number of divorces in 2014 occurred in Milwaukee County (2,291 divorces and 7 annulments), followed by Dane County (1,296 divorces and 4 annulments) and Waukesha County (1,083 divorces and 1 annulment), reflecting the large populations of these three counties.
- Fifty-two percent of all Wisconsin divorces in 2014 involved families with children under 18 years of age. Among divorces involving children, an average of 1.9 children were affected by each divorce.

- The median age for people marrying for the first time in 2014 was 27.5. In 1960, the median age at first marriage was 21.6.
- The median age for people remarrying in 2014 was 47.6, compared to 42.5 in 1960.

## **Technical Notes**

### **Marriage Reporting Requirements**

The following is a brief outline of the sequence of events which take place when a marriage occurs in Wisconsin:

- The filing party (officiant) must register the marriage certificate with the local Register of Deeds (where the marriage took place) within three (3) days after the event.
- The local Register of Deeds must transmit the marriage certificate to the State Registrar within 10 working days after its receipt.

### **Divorce Reporting Requirements**

The following is what takes place when a divorce occurs in Wisconsin:

- At the end of every biweekly period, the filing party (clerk of any court) must send to the State Registrar a report of every divorce or annulment of marriage granted during that period.
