Public Health Accreditation update: the mock site visit will occur April 12 - 13; formal site visit with the <u>Public Health Accreditation Board</u> team on May 7 – 8. The Council may be involved as a partner to the Division. Communicable Disease will use a workgroup to determine funding formulas. There is a health equity initiative across the Division to explore and align health equity efforts to build capacity and impact health equity. Influenza update: it is a bad season; 100 hospitalization/day across the state. Dementia: The Division's Bureau of Aging and Disability Resources is part of DHS' dementia-friendly community project to set a Steering Committee to revitalize this effort. PH Surveillance meeting: the goal is to get robust data that can be drilled down and visualized on local level. Currently using it internally for performance management and help locals who may not have epis on staff, also for the State health Assessment. The Division has weekly communication to figure out the status of the Health Commissioner position in the Milwaukee Health Department. DHS Legislative Updates – Jon Hoelter The Session is coming to an end. The Assembly will wrap up business by February. Signed into law on 11/30: 2017 XB 342, screening school district employees for tuberculosis. 2017 AB 344, bill for hospice workers to transfer controlled substances after death of a client. 		 Due to accreditation requirements, the Division will move to a 5-year vs. a 10-yr health plan. The state health assessment process is starting now for next year, to be followed by a new state health improvement plan. Susan Uttech will lead this process. Preliminary findings to come out next few months, and the preliminary draft in the next few months. The team solicited input from the partners in the last few months of the year. There will be a <i>Healthy Wisconsin</i> annual addendum in June. Guidance is being solicited from subject matter experts. The Division's Office of Health Informatics has updated data and new indicators able to be shared. This will be reviewed with the Council in April, and guidance is sought with regards to the addendum. In June it will be reviewed with the Council and published by end of June. By the end of March, annual metrics will be established for each priority area.

	ProgressUpdated data	 Opioids: the <u>SCAODA Opioid Advisory Workgroup</u> will focus on upstream prevention. The Division of Care and Treatment Services, the DHS Director of Opioid Initiatives and the Division's Bureau of Communicable Diseases will lead the effort.
		 Suicide: the <u>Prevent Suicide Wisconsin</u> Steering Committee (Mental Health America of Wisconsin) will be the external Priority Action Team. A charter has been adopted; an external implementation team is in place; DPH and the Office of Policy and Practice Alignment will send staff to the Prevent Suicide Wisconsin Annual Conference in April.
		• Tobacco: a steering committee is in place, the Division's Bureau of Community Health Promotion will be the lead.
		 The overarching priority area for the plan is <u>Adverse Childhood Experiences</u> (ACEs). Robin Matthies is coordinating this. She gave the Council an overview of ACEs, including how the concept is woven into <u>Healthy Wisconsin</u>.
		 Healthy Wisconsin implementation is identified as a priority on the Division's strategic plan.
		 Performance management and Implementation coordination: there is a communications plan, an annual addendum and a data piece (dashboard and data visualization). The dashboard will be accessible and usable to local health departments.
		 Looking to build a stronger connection with <u>What Works for Health</u> to make sure all of priorities are covered with evidence-based interventions. A toolkit is being built for the



			 solicitation of success stories. For example: Alcohol will feature the social host law. Opioids will feature Sauk County and other collaborative community efforts. Suicide will feature a story on mental-health friendly communities.
