Why is voting important?

- It's a constitutionally protected right
- It's a chance to choose decision makers who determine policies that impact people with disabilities and older adults
- It's a civic responsibility





Your role in supporting voter rights for residents

Federal regulations state that residents of long-term care facilities who are eligible voters have the right to vote; facilities must ensure the resident can exercise that right; and voting residents are supported by the facility in exercising that right.



Your role in supporting voter rights for residents

- Voting is an important resident rights issue
- Eligible voters retain the right to vote unless it has been removed by a judge
- All voters regardless of where they reside have the right to be free of interference, coercion, and discrimination in exercising their right to vote.
- LTC staff have a responsibility to assist residents in exercising the right to vote; any assistance provide must be directed by the voter.



U.S. Citizen

At least 18 years old on Election Day

Voter Eligibility

Resided at current address for 28 days prior to election

Not currently serving a sentence for a felony conviction

Not been determined by a court to be ineligible to vote



First time voters

If you have moved since you last registered (even if to a different apartment in the same building)


Who Needs to Register (or Reregister)

If you've changed your name

If you haven't voted in over 4 years

If your voting rights have been resorted





You can check registration status, register, and update voter registration (and more!) at MyVote.WI.Gov



Tips for assisting residents with voter registration

Ask new residents if they are registered to vote and remind them they may need to update their registration or re-register

- Do they want to register online, by mail, in person, or at the polls? Provide information on their preferred option.
- If they want to register online, do they have an eligible photo ID? If not, provide information on how they can obtain one.
- Do they have proof of residence? (pro tip: an intake document or contract could be used)
- Encourge them to use myvote.wi.gov as a resource as they are able



How can residents vote?

With a Special Voting Deputy (in qualifying facilities)

Absentee ballot

In-Person Absentee Voting (IPAV, or "early voting")

In person on Election Day



Special Voting Deputies for Care Facilities

At least 5 registered electors of the municipality who are occupants of the facility

At least one absentee ballot application from an occupant of the facility

At least 10 residents



Special Voting Deputies for Care Facilities



Family

- May be present during voting
- Can assist family member with voting IF requested by the resident
- May request SVD visit dates and times from facility



Observers

- Election observers are allowed to observe during SVD voting
- Must register with clerk in advance
- Cannot enter resident room without resident's permission



Role of Facility Staff

- Coordinate location in facility for voting
- Staff CANNOT assist resident with voting if SVDs are conducting voting.



Absentee Voting

- Any eligible Wisconsin voter can request an absentee ballot.
- Voters must submit a written request to their municipal clerk for an absentee ballot; this can be done online.
- Voters must be registered BEFORE requesting an absentee ballot.
- If a voter needs an accommodate for their absentee ballot, such as a large print or braille ballot, that information should be included as a part of the request and submitted to the clerk as soon as possible.



Absentee Voting

- Voters can request an absentee ballot for a single or multiple elections in the current calendar year.
- Absentee ballot requests for 2026 elections can be made beginning January 1, 2026.
- Voters who are not indefinitely confined need to provide an eligible photo ID with their absentee ballot request.
- Voters who consider themselves indefinitely confined do not need to present a photo ID but do need to indicate they are indefinitely confined.



Tips for assisting residents with absentee ballots

If they are registered at another residence they maintain, ask if they'd like to vote from that address or the facility's address

Assist with requesting an absentee ballot.

Ensure residents are aware some accessible options are available for absentee ballots.

Make sure residents understand if their absentee ballot will be delivered by an SVD

If the resident is not being served by an SVD, staff can assist the voter with their absentee ballot at the voter's request



In Person Absentee Voting

- Also called "early voting" or "IPAV"
- Dates, times, and locations are determined by each municipality.
- Can occur between 14 days prior to the election through the Sunday before the election.
- Check with your municipal clerk about availability of IPAV in your community.
- Currently, curbside voting and accessible voting systems are encouraged but not required at IPAV locations. If a resident would like to utilize one of these options at an IPAV location, please be sure to check with the municipal clerk to make sure it will be an available option.



Election Day Voting

- Polls are open from 7:00AM to 8:00PM.
- Voters MUST vote at their polling location on Election Day.
- Polling locations can be found at MyVote.WI.Gov or by contacting your municipal clerk.
- Curbside voting is required to be offered at every polling location for voters with disabilities who have difficulty entering the polling place.
- Each polling place is required to have an accessible voting system.





Only a judge!

Who and what CANNOT stop an eligible voter from voting:

- A guardian, family member, friend, care provider, or another person
 - An Activated Power of Attorney
 - A medical diagnosis




Tips for assisting residents who are under guardianship understand their eligibility

Help them locate their "Determination and Order on Petition for Guardianship Due to Incompetency" form (GN-3170)

If they do not have a copy of this form, help them obtain it through the Probate Court in their county of residence

Assist in locating in the form the checkbox which indicates if their right to vote has been removed.
