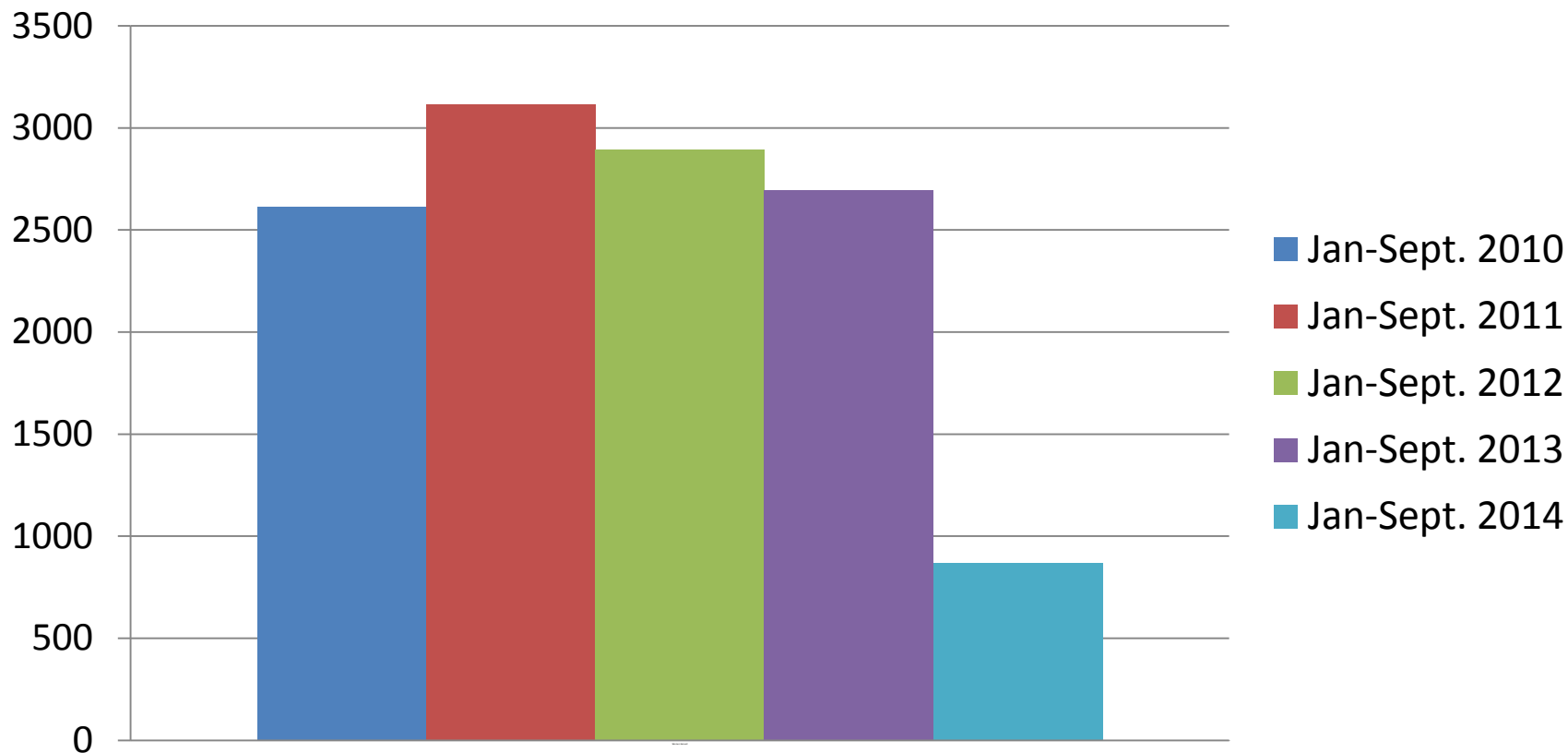


Background

In December, 2013, the Department proposed a restructure of the WWP to ensure that it remains viable and available for women who need it, even as many women served by the screening program found they could access comprehensive coverage through BadgerCare or the federal health insurance Marketplace.

Original Proposal

The Department's original proposal replaced the current network of 1,000 provider sites and 83 local coordinating agencies with a model in which health systems would provide both screening and coordination services.



Current plan based on stakeholder feedback

- Provider network will include health systems, FQHCs, hospital outpatient clinics, and rural health clinics.
- Provider role will be unchanged.
- Multi-jurisdictional agencies housed in local health departments will provide coordination services.
- ForwardHealth System: Based on your input, a decision was made to continue to use this system for at least the remainder of the current cooperative agreement.



Workgroup Charge

- Provide recommendations on the organizational structure for the future WWWP model for the service coordination component;
- Communicate with local public health officers and WWWP coordinators within their respective regions to provide information and updates on work group progress and to gather feedback for inclusion in workgroup discussions;
- Provide recommendations on the provider network transition as directly linked to service coordination, and;
- Submit a document with recommendations for the future WWWP model to the DPH Administrator for consideration by November 15, 2014.

- The workgroup included two members with experience working with multi-jurisdictional programs.

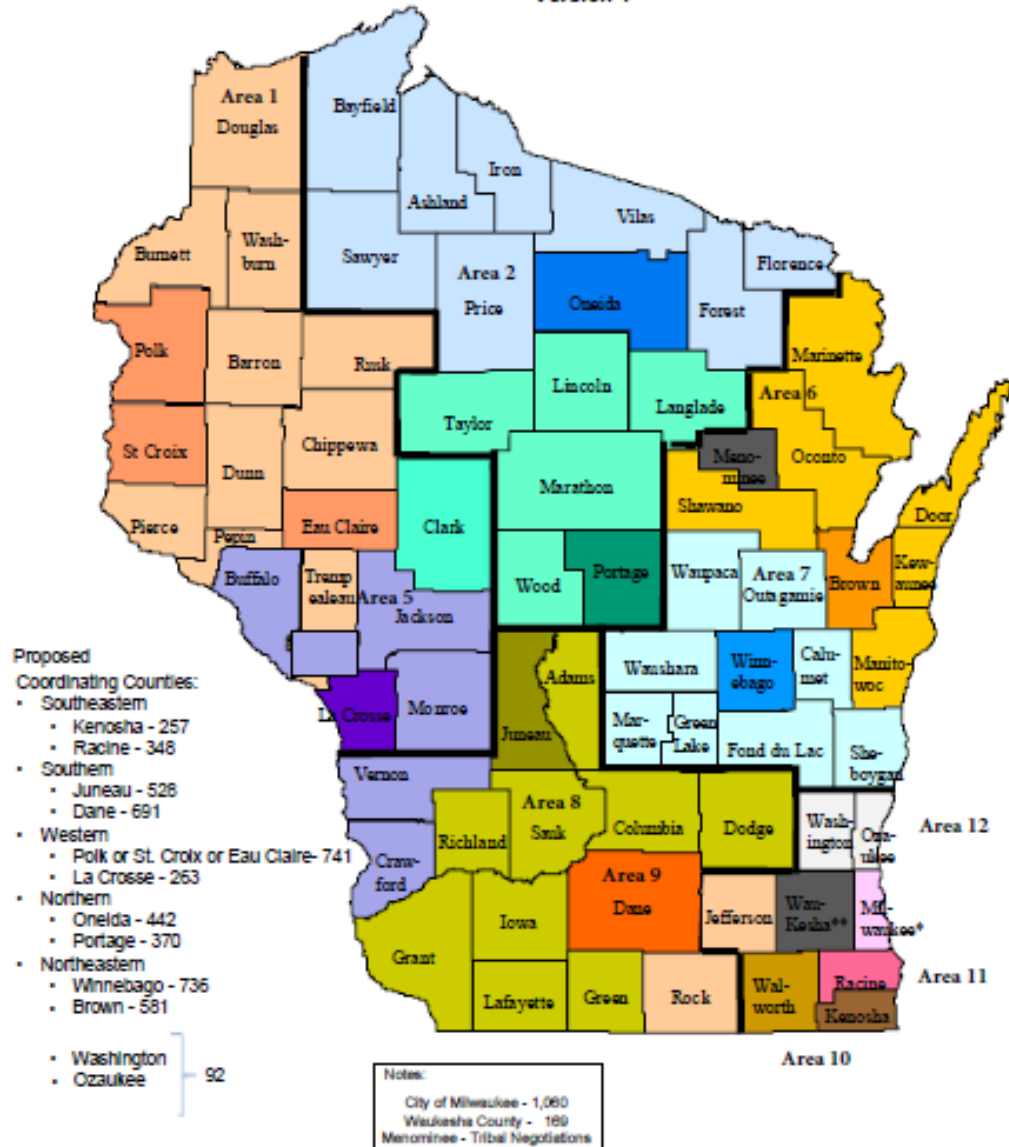


New Model Workgroup Recommendations for Multi- Jurisdictional Areas (MJAs)

- Unique areas: Waukesha, Milwaukee.

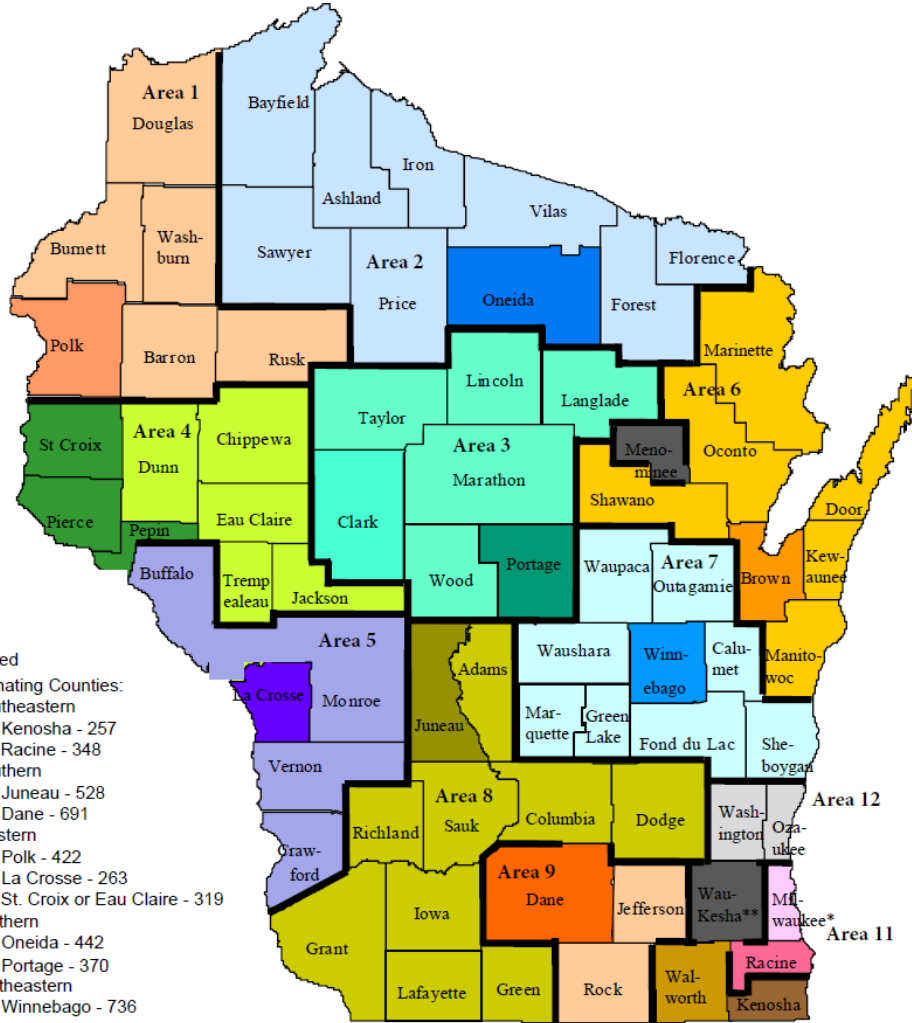

New Model Development: Key Recent Events

- New Model Workgroup submitted recommendations for multi-jurisdictional service coordination on November 14.
- Survey on recommendations posted on WWWP webpage for comment on November 17. Comment period closes today (December 5).
- Meeting today (December 5).



New Model Development Timeline

- Providers – Request for Application (RFA) to be issued this afternoon (December 5, 2014); deadline of January 26, 2015.
- April 1, 2015 – the new service coordination model will be in place.
- April 1, 2015 – new provider network will be in place.
- June 30, 2015 – the current service coordination model will end.
- NOTE: The three-month overlap in coordination models will allow for a seamless transition for clients.



Transition Process: Working Together

- Working together, we can ensure a smooth transition for our WWWW clients.
- Collaboration on consistent communications materials and efforts will be key going forward to assist all clients who need the program.
